## Some of Worcester Roots' 2018 Accomplishments:

• This year's Co-op Academy began with a month long curriculum focused on racial justice. 28 social justice activists and community members participated in the 14-week Co-op Academy course on business

planning, advancing their marketing plans, financial projections, etc. and preparing for incorporation. They are paired up with mentors and connected with regional networks.



- We brought one of the largest delegations to the 2018 Worker Co-op National Conference, and contributed workshops and youth perspectives to this key movement building space.
- Worcester Roots provided over 300 hours of staff time to four start up mission-based cooperative businesses to help them prepare for operations and train their members.
- We helped bring WooRides, a sustainable transportation co-op with a just transition lens made up by all people of color through the startup phase to incorporation and independence.
- We joined the national Workers To Owners Collaborative and have begun the support of a conversion of a Latinx-led home improvement network of companies towards a cooperative and greater involvement in

related social and economic justice movements.

• We also saw the real gelling of cooperation amongst cooperatives this past year, with the solidification of Cooperation Worcester and progress in the campaign to leverage university purchasing power to support our grassroots co-ops. We met with purchasing directors the HECCMA (consortium of colleges in Central MA) and are moving the anchor purchasing campaign forward.

- Our work with the Worcester Community Labor Coalition has heated up with the Worcester Red Sox Ballpark being built in Worcester and the organizing we've done around a Community Benefit Agreement. Racial and economic justice, supporting cooperatives, affordable housing and renewable energy are all in the current draft of the CBA being negotiated. We hope this long term strategy supports job creation and eventually the cooperatives we support.
- We led an equity in building trades outreach and training campaign with members of the Worcester Community Labor Coalition. This project included the creation of a printed and online apprenticeship directory, outreach and social media work that reached estimated 55,000, brought 42 attendees out to trainings and 77 to info sessions. This work led to the recruitment of 3 females, 7 males; 6 Hispanic, 3 African American, 1 Caucasian to the Worcester Building Pathways Spring 2018 class.
- In the Worcester Youth Co-op, 8 youth participants in our training programs participated in over 25 workshops on worker cooperatives, life skills, environ-



mental justice, community organizing and social justice.

• Worcester Roots was a lead organizer of the successful New Economy Summit at Worcester State Universi-



ty which brought together entrepreneurs, community activists, institutional leaders and students for a daylong conference launching the Worcester-based Social Venture Collaborative.


